### Local Law No. 4 of the Year 2015

Amending Town of Great Valley Zoning Code, Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Map
<a href="Creating a Sand, Gravel">Creating a Sand, Gravel</a>, Topsoil and Clay Mining Overlay District

### August 10, 2015

The Great Valley Town Board hereby enacts as Local Law No. 4 of the Year 2015 the creation of a sand, gravel, topsoil and clay mining overlay district in the Town of Great Valley which includes amendment of Town Comprehensive Plan, Zoning Code and Zoning Map.

### 1. Legislative Intent

To create a sand, gravel topsoil and clay mining overlay district.

### 2. Amendments to Comprehensive Plan

### a. Legislative Findings

New York Town Law § 272-a(11)(a) requires that "all town land use regulations must be in accordance with a comprehensive plan." The Town of Great Valley Comprehensive Plan, Adopted December 10, 2007, states at 1.5 that the Comprehensive Plan should be reviewed approximately every ten years.

When adopted in 2007, the Comprehensive Plan recommended "that additional gravel mining should not be allowed in the Town of Great Valley" – see 9.3. This was predicated upon two findings:

- i. "There are currently five gravel mines in Great Valley that have been permitted by NYSDEC. This is considered to be the maximum level of gravel mining that is supportable for the area" see 9.3; and
- ii. "Mining ... would adversely affect the potential for agricultural use of the property" see 7-1.

Regarding the amount of mines as of 2015, there still are five NYSDEC permitted mines according to NYSDEC records, however, as the list at Exhibit A shows, there are only 103.60 acres left of mineable land, meaning that the amount of mineable land has been reduced significantly since 2007. This includes the Town's gravel mine, which only has 5 acres of mineable land remaining. This means that when the Town's gravel mine is depleted, the Town will have to purchase sand, gravel, topsoil and clay and costs

increase when there are no local sources due to trucking costs. Accordingly, the Comprehensive Plan should be amended to reflect these changes.

Regarding agricultural land, it is true that mining reduces agricultural land, however the same land ideal for agriculture is also ideal for mining. There does not seem to be a demand for agricultural land and some farms have ceased to be used as agricultural use. Also, while public policy favors agricultural, there is no public policy argument against mining. In fact, New York Environmental Conservation Law § 23-2703 stresses the importance of mining, by including the following New York State Public Policy Statement regarding the importance of mining:

The legislature hereby declares that it is the policy of this state to foster and encourage the development of an economically sound and stable mining industry, and the orderly development of domestic mineral resources and reserves necessary to assure satisfaction of economic needs compatible with sound environmental management practices.

In order to properly evaluate the balance of farming and agricultural land, it is recommended that the Comprehensive Plan be reviewed five years from enactment of this Local Law regarding this issue.

### b. Amendments to Comprehensive Plan

The Comprehensive Plan shall be amended as follows (additions are in italics):

i. Section 9.3 entitled "Development Policies" is hereby amended to add as the second paragraph of the Section entitled "Gravel Mining" as follows:

Notwithstanding said inherent conflict, New York Environmental Conservation Law § 23-2703 stresses the importance of mining, by including the following New York State Public Policy Statement regarding the importance of mining:

The legislature hereby declares that it is the policy of this state to foster and encourage the development of an economically sound and stable mining industry, and the orderly development of domestic mineral resources and reserves necessary to assure satisfaction of economic needs compatible with sound environmental management practices.

It is the 2015 finding of the Town Board that permitted mining land has been depleted to approximately 103 acres in the Town. As mineable land is a plentiful resource in the Town and is needed for infrastructure and construction projects, the Town Board has enacted a mining overlay district.

However, the concern about the inherent conflict between mining and agriculture still exists, therefore this provision of the Comprehensive Plan and the existence of the Mining Overlay District should be studied again in five years to ensure proper balance between mining and agriculture.

ii. Section 9.3 entitled "Development Policies" is hereby amended to change the existing second paragraph which shall become the new third paragraph of the Section entitled "Gravel Mining" as follows:

In 2007, there were five gravel mines in Great Valley that have been permitted by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, however as of 2015, while there were still five permitted mines, the reserves of these mines had been depleted to approximately 103 acres. While the finding in 2007 was that the amount of permitted mining land was "the maximum level of gravel mining that is supportable for the area", the 2015 data shows a need for additional permitted mining land. However, the concern about too much permitted mining land still at any one time still exists, therefore this provision of the Comprehensive Plan and the existence of the Mining Overlay District should be studied again in five years to reexamine this concern.

### 3. Content of Local Law

Local Law Creating Mining Overlay District Authorizing Sand, Gravel, Topsoil and Clay Mining

Sand, Gravel, Topsoil and Clay Mines are an expressly permitted use in the Mining Overlay District on properties pursuant to the attached list of properties where:

- a) a mining permit from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has been issued; and
- b) The Permit Holder agrees in its Mining Permit Conditions or by Declaration of Restrictions enforceable by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and/or the Town of Great Valley to reclaim concurrently to the maximum extent practicable.

### 4. When Effective

Following adoption, this Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State as required by law.

# 5. Severability Provision

Should any part of this Local Law be held contrary to law, the remainder shall continue in full force and effect.
