Supervisor Donald Emhardt opened the regular meeting at 7:00 P.M. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Departmental Reports:

<u>Town Clerk</u> report was submitted and filed. Fees collected for July totaled \$27,188.50 and disbursed as follows:

Supervisor-A Fund: \$26,640.62 B Fund: \$100.00, SS1 Fund: \$19,607.34 SW3 Fund \$2,532.27 NYS DEC license sales: \$250.38, NYS Animal Population Control program: \$95.00, Dept. of Health \$202.50. 9 Marriage licenses were issued, and 40 record requests completed. Dog license renewals mailed for July and 2nd notices sent for all expired licenses. Penalty posted for all unpaid Sewer and Water bills. Currently working with the School and County preparing for School Tax Collection which will be collected in our office September 1st through November 4, 2022. Received notice from the State that Local Law 3 for 2022 was received. Worked with engineers preparing the CFA applications for Sewer District 1 North and South extensions and the Comprehensive Planning grant. Chautauqua County Humane Society gave all towns in the County a 30-day notice that they will not be renewing their primary holding agreements due to the facility being at max capacity. They will consider a secondary holding agreement for any unclaimed dogs after the required holding period in a primary shelter. We are currently working with the Dog Control officer for shelter options.

<u>Code/Zoning</u> Office reported and on file. A total of 32 building permits were issued, 25 Town and 7 Village, with total project value of \$611,025.00 and 31 Certificates of Completion issued with project values totaling \$1,485,935.00.

A variance was granted for the construction of a gazebo in the Residential-Lakeside district. Two variances and 1 Special Use permit are scheduled to be heard at the August zoning meeting. Two applications were referred to the Village of Mayville requiring variances for sheds in the R1 Residential District.

<u>Highway</u> report submitted and on file. Chip sealed intersections. Finished building pad and driveway for wellsite off of Springbrook Rd for Water District 2. Repairing brake assembly on dozer and

mowing roadsides. Helped Village with blacktopping Village streets. New plow truck is finished and will be going to Fleet for the final inspection.

<u>Assessor</u>'s report was submitted and filed with the Clerk's office. The office has been working on filing assessment rolls with Chautauqua Lake and Sherman School Districts. They will use the assessment roll to calculate their school tax rates for each municipality for the upcoming school tax. A final copy of the assessment roll has been forwarded to the County Real Property Tax office to produce the tax bills.

Committee Reports:

<u>Comprehensive Plan.</u> Supervisor Emhardt stated that the Town is working on a comprehensive plan and Councilman Cummings will be Chairing it. Mr. Cummings reported speaking with Grace Disantis of Barton & Loguidice who will be submitting a grant application this fall for the combined Town and Village Plan. With it being a combined planned, chances are good that we will be awarded the grant with the Town and Village sharing 10% of the overall costs. Next step would be for the Town and Village to appoint a steering committee of 12 to lead the plan through its development. This committee should include 2 members from the Town Board, 2 from the Village Board, 1 admin from either Village or Town and various members from the school, local businesses, and community. Town Justice, Tim Hull volunteered to serve on the committee. Councilman Carlson stated he would serve as an alternate if needed. Councilman Cummings accepted the appointment and stated he would like to aim for a meeting mid-September after the two boards appoint the rest of the committee members. All meetings would be open to the public and community input will be strongly encouraged.

<u>Sewer District 1 Extension North-</u> Consolidated Funding Applications are being submitted. Councilman Cummings stated he was contacted by the County Health department inquiring about a timeline for public sewer in the area. Ramboll engineer, Mike Manning, stated the extension is moving forward and construction is proposed to start spring of 2023. <u>Water District 2 Water Source and Extension</u>. Bond information is being forwarded for the Board's review for the increase and improvement of Water District 2.

Water District 2- Resolution Land Acquisition

WHEREAS, the Town of Chautauqua, Water District 2, is currently under an Order of Consent by the Environmental Protection Agency to find an alternative water supply to serve Water District 2; and

WHEREAS, an investigation study dated March 11, 2021, identified property outside of the current district to be the most feasible location for a new water supply; and

WHEREAS, the Town has worked with the property owner through an MOU dated April 29, 2021, to conduct the necessary tests confirming the site would be capable of producing the required volume to serve the district; and

WHEREAS, the site was found viable to serve the current district in which the district was extended on April 11, 2022 to include the location of the new well sites; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board feels it would be in the best interest of the District and Town to acquire the property located in the Town of Chautauqua, part of which fronts Springbrook Road and designated on the official Chautauqua County Tax Map as Section 264.00, Block 2 Lot 12 to install and maintain two(2) municipal water wells and a new water treatment plant,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board approves the Purchase of 11.6 acres for the fair market value of \$5,000.00 per acre, paying all closing costs not to exceed \$1,000.00,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Town Board authorizes the Town Supervisor to execute the purchase agreement paying the \$5,000.00 deposit within five (5) days of signing

Water District 2- Bond

A RESOLUTION CALLING A PUBLIC HEARING OF THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF CHAUTAUQUA, CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY, NEW YORK, PURSUANT TO SECTION 202-b OF THE TOWN LAW, TO CONSIDER AN INCREASE AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE FACILITIES OF THE TOWN OF CHAUTAUQUA WATER DISTRICT NO. 2 IN AND FOR SAID TOWN AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$6,700,000.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Chautauqua, Chautauqua County, New York, has had under consideration a map and plan was well as an estimated of cost for a proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of Water District No. 2 in said Town (hereinafter, "Water District No. 2" or simply, the "District"), a general plan to drill new wells for and make some improvements to the said District, and a report of the proposed method of financing and operation thereof; and

WHEREAS, said map, plan and report, including an estimate of the cost, were prepared by Ramboll, competent engineers duly licensed by the State of New York, and have been filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, where the same are available during regular office hours for examination by any persons interested in the subject matter thereof, including estimate of cost; and

WHEEREAS, the Town Board previously extended the boundaries of the District by resolution adopted April 11, 2022, which resolution also approved the installation of two (2) groundwater wells in the hamlet of Dewittville, the construction of a support building of approximately 1,000 square feet to house water softening equipment and chlorination equipment, exterior 15,000 gallon above-ground clear well tank, standby natural gas driven generator and electrical/instrumentation systems, a flow distribution structure (below grade) and an absorption field for handling of process wastewaters; the construction of a support building of approximately 120 square feet at the Existing Standpipe site to house chlorination equipment and electrical/instrumentation systems, a new altitude valve and vault for connection to existing standpipe inlet/outlet piping; demolition/decommissioning of the existing water treatment plant building and equipment; approximately 14,200 linear feet of 8-inch diameter pipeline; tee connections and valving for future extensions; and fire hydrants, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery, apparatus, valves, hydrants, appurtenances, and incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith, all as more fully described in the map, plan and report hereinbefore described; and

WHEREAS, the description of the boundaries of said District is available for review at the Town Clerk's office, but generally includes all of the Chautauqua Lake Estates, Point Chautauqua, Dewittville, and all of the land between Springbrook Road on the north, Chautauqua Lake on the southwest, and the town line on the south and east; and

WHEREAS, the maximum estimated cost of said improvements is \$6,700,000; and

WHEREAS, the proposed method to be employed for financing such improvement is the issuance of serial bonds for the balance, and

WHEREAS, the Town intends to apply to other sources of low interest loan and grant funding that would reduce the local costs and the cost estimates set out below, including from the Water Infrastructure Improvements Grants and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund administered by the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation; and

WHEREAS, all users within the District will pay for the capital costs of the new water supply and transmission lines running therefrom, for the operation and maintenance costs of the District, and for the capital improvements fund, but only users within the extension area will also pay for the capital costs of the southward extension of the waterlines within the extension area; and

WHEREAS, assuming the Town receives minimum of \$3,000,000 grant funding for the project, the estimated cost to the typical property in the first year in which operation, maintenance, debt service and other charges and expenses are to be paid is: (1) to customers within the existing District (174 equivalent dwelling units) \$1,121.86; and (2) to customers within the extension area who are benefitted but not connected (122 half-EDU), \$287.95.

WHEREAS, as the customer base expands within the extended District to approximately 350 total EDU, the estimated annual cost to the typical property is expected to be \$794.61; and

WHEREAS, at full buildout, with a total of 519 EDU across the entire District, the estimated annual cost to the typical property is estimated to be \$530.51; and

WHEREAS, a detailed explanation of the manner by which were computed said estimated costs of fees and first-year costs to the typical property has been filed in the office of the Town Clerk at 2 Academy Street in Mayville, New York where the same are available during regular office hours for examination by any person interested in the subject manner thereof; and

WHEREAS, said capital project for said District and the extension thereof have been determined to be an Unlisted Action pursuant to the regulations of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation promulgated pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act, the implementation of which as proposed, the Town Board has determined will not result in any significant environmental effects and a Short Environmental Assessment Form is available on file in the office of the Town Clerk where it may be inspected during normal office hours; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to call a public hearing on said proposed increase and improvement pursuant to Section 202-b of the Town Law; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

ORDERED, by the Town Board of the Town of Chautauqua, Chautauqua County, New York, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> A meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Chautauqua, Chautauqua County, New York, shall be held at the Chautauqua Community Building, 2 Academy Street, Mayville, New York, in said Town, on the 23rd day of August, 2022, at 10:00 o'clock A.M., Prevailing Time, for the purpose of holding a public hearing on the proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of Water District No. 2 in said Town, referred to in the preambles hereof, at which time and place said Town Board will hear all persons interested in the subject thereof concerning the same.

<u>Section 2.</u> It is hereby determined that all expenses of the Water District No. 2, including all Districts heretofore or hereafter established, shall be a charge against the entire area of said Water District No. 2, as

extended, except that the area currently served by water within said District shall be treated as a separate benefit district within the larger district.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause a copy of this order to be published once in the *Jamestown Post-Journal*, the official newspaper of said Town, the first publication thereof to be not less than ten nor more than twenty days before the day set herein for the hearing as aforesaid, and said Town Clerk shall also cause a copy thereof to be posted on the sign-board of the Town maintained pursuant to subdivision 6 of Section 30 of the Town Law not less than ten nor more than twenty days before the day set for the hearing as aforesaid.

Supervisor Emhardt stated he could not see the benefit of taking this property off the tax rolls but would talk with the owner to see if there is an interest in selling it. Councilman Carlson stated he would prefer to have a formal request sent from the Town's attorney.
